Dear Colleagues,

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The HCS has a rich heritage, a strong journal, but it is losing members and the meetings are not well attended. This is an honest assessment of the HCS in September 2001.



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On October 12, 2001 twenty past, present, and future leaders of the HCS met for a three day Strategic Planning Retreat in an attempt to find a focus for our goals and energies to move the HCS forward. Many ABSTRACT DEADLINE of those attending were skeptical of the value of this type of meeting, but our facilitator, Jim Whitehead, showed us that we were wrong. Not only did we arrive at a list of goals, but we assigned responsibility for accomplishing the goals. It was a very exciting meeting, and it is hard to communicate the high level of enthusiasm generated.

> I left the meeting with a new sense of purpose and a strong feeling of optimism. My summary of the outcome of the meeting is: The HCS serves as "the" resource for histochemical and cytochemical knowledge and must disseminate this knowledge through networking, outreach, conferences, print publications, and electronic publications. The strength of the HCS is its members! As part of these new activities the society will ask members for their help, and offer them opportunities for unique interactions with other members. The major incentive will be the ability to network with experts in the field.

I would like to list the most important initiatives. I will be brief to give a flavor of each initiative: more details are available from the contact person.

Expand the HCS influence and value:

- Establishing an electronic journal of Histochemical and Cytochemical methods (Cy Wilcox and Joe Mazurkiewicz).
- •Enhance the online Histochemical Knowledge database (Hinke Multhaupt)
- Significantly increase the HCS's impact through membership growth and support of the HCS traditions of scholarly and clinical excellence:

- Increase membership services
- •Establish a Membership Committee (Jim Hainfeld)
- Advance educational excellence and service through meeting strategies that emphasize new areas of knowledge, networking and collaborative activities:
- Explore meetings with a similar organization each year (Beth Unger)
- Establish a Program Committee (Chuck Frevert)
- Make the HCS a valuable and responsive organization to its members:
- Redesign the HCS committee infrastructure with increased numbers of members on committees (Dick Burry)
- Develop a business plan for the HCS finances (Kevin Roth)
- Establish a Corporate Relations Committee (Steven Carmichael)

To accomplish these goals, the leadership of the HCS will absolutely need the help of the HCS members. I am asking each HCS member to look over the above list of initiatives and select one or even two that they would like to work on. I have included the name of the person responsible for each initiative and their email addresses are listed below. CALL FOR NOMINATIONS

Officers and Councilor

Nominations for officers are now being accepted. Nominations may be made for the offices of President-Elect-Designate and Councilor. Any member of the Society may submit nominations. Nominees for President-Elect-Designate (President 2005) must have at least one year's service on the council prior to the start of his/her term. Councilors shall have held regular membership in the Society for at least two consecutive years prior to the start of their terms. The individual making the nomination must secure permission of the nominee. Nomination should be made in writing and include a brief biographical sketch of the nominee.

The Vector Laboratories Young Investigator Award (Seattle 2002)

To be eligible for this award applicants should be either junior faculty members or postdoctoral fellows within three years of their thesis-earned doctorate at the time of the annual meeting. Applicants must submit a paper accepted for presentation at the annual meeting of which he/she is the senior (or sole) author. Membership in the Society is encouraged but not required. The award consists of a certificate and a \$500 cash prize to defray travel expense to the annual meeting. Applicants should indicate their intention to apply for the award on the abstract submission form. Applicants should provide a curriculum vitae and letter of intent prior to the meeting. These should be mailed to the Executive Director of the Society.

The Ralph D. Lillie Award (Seattle 2002)

This award is presented each year to the applicant who submits the outstanding student paper or poster for inclusion in the annual meeting program. The applicant must be a doctoral student or a first year postdoctoral fellow (i.e. within one year of having received the doctoral degree at the time of the annual meeting) and be the senior (or sole) author of an abstract selected for presentation. Membership in the Society is encouraged but not required. Applicants should indicate their intention to apply for the award on the abstract submission form. The award consists of a certificate and a \$200 cash prize. The applicant should provide a letter of intent and support from his/her mentor prior to the meeting. This should be mailed to the Executive Director of the Society.

Outstanding Young Investigator Award (Seattle 2002)

The Future Directions Committee is coliniting pominations

The Future Directions Committee is soliciting nominations for the Outstanding Young Investigator Award which may be awarded at the July 2002 meeting in Seattle. This is a cash award in the amount of \$1,000 to be given to a junior investigator (for example, at the instructor, assistant professor, or early in associate professor rank) who demonstrates exceptional potential as a histochemist. The Awardee will submit an abstract and give a platform presentation highlighting his or her contributions involving histochemistry. To place a name in nomination (you may nominate yourself), send a letter outlining the candidates contributions and a current *curriculum vitae* to:
